A Program of Advent Repentance with St. John the Baptist

For those who seek peace within, so as to be of service in our times.

We have designed this examination of conscience for the Faithful to use prayerfully this Advent. We encourage all to sign up for one of our hour-long Advent retreat opportunities (watch the bulletin for full details). The post-pandemic era will be a time of mission for the Church. We will need to:

- Reach out to those who have become isolated during these long months.
- Invite people to resume the practice of their faith.
- Testify to the Lord's promise of life, and to the whole faith which has sustained us through a difficult period—especially to those who are exhausted and fearful.

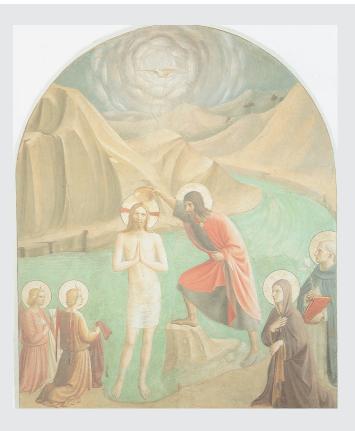
The question for us is: are we ready spiritually for this shared challenge?

During the last five years, unique political, social, and health factors have exerted great pressure on us. Many of us realize that our moral and spiritual lives have been affected. As individuals and as groups we have behaved, spoken, and thought in ways not consistent with the Gospel. As a result we are far from each other and from ourselves. We seek to resume the disciplines of life in family and Church, in society and politics, but our first step must be to take stock of ourselves. First, a prayer:

Lord, by the gift of your Holy Spirit make me attentive to myself with openness to your truth and confidence in your mercy. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

And so we ask ourselves:

- Who has offended or hurt me in these years that I now need to unbind, knowing that as I have struggled so have they?
- Have I demonized any person or group?



- Have I wished evil upon any person or group?
- Do I perceive the humanity of those who disagree with me?
- Have I made fervent convictions out of other people's opinions, giving these automatic credence, in the way of a false Gospel.
- Is my conversation constructive?
- Have my patterns of speech deteriorated during this time?
- In the pressures of these times, how have I treated those closest to me?
- Is my Christian identity paramount, or do I see myself more readily as part of a political or social group? Have I made victimhood my primary identity, assuming that others are prejudiced against me?
- Have I accorded hero status to anyone apart from Christ, the only Savior and Messiah?
- Have I dealt with the restrictions of COVID in a patient and charitable fashion?
- During the time of the pandemic have I given due respect to the decisions of legitimate authority, even when my personal opinion differs?
- Am I committed to pursuing the virtue of justice as regards God, my family, my church, my government, my employer, and myself, considered bodily and spiritually?
- Have I over-consumed news and opinion media in ways that have left me angry and suspicious of the world around me, so that I cannot testify to the victory of Christ?
- Have I cut myself off from all news such that I do not play my proper part in society?
- During this period how have I been a good steward of my body and mind? Does my personal appearance reflect my baptismal dignity and my proper love of the body God gave me.?
- During these challenging years have I coped with tension by resorting to drugs, alcohol, or pornography? Do I now want to experience the serene joy of the virtue of temperance?
- To whom do I owe an apology?
- In what ways have I used the pandemic as an excuse not to meet my obligations?

Once again, we invite each of you to sign up for an hour-long Advent retreat with this instrument. Ultimately we hope that you can bring the fruits of this examination to your Advent Confession. We will offer extended hours for Confessions throughout the Season of Advent. Please know that you are also welcome to speak personally to each one of us. May the Lord use these days to renew your hope. Advent Peace!
